A 'quiet' revival?

"Christianity has died many times and risen again, for it had a God who knew the way out of the grave." (G. K. Chesterton).


Revd Lawson comments ... Over the last two or three years, I have very cautiously been commenting that it does seem that there is a new open-ness to the Christians faith, and that some churches are finding that there is a particular open-ness among younger people. Over the summer, where I attended a conference attended by 12,000 people, I can only say that have spoken to many church leaders who are still, cautiously, saying the same thing. I keep hearing stories of young people coming to faith at home and turning up at church saying 'I'm a Christian what do I do next!?'.

Indeed, this phenomenon has been reported recently in the national press. Justin Brierly, whose podcast 'Unbelievable' has millions of followers, has likewise published a book titled: 'The surprising rebirth of belief in God'. Much as the 'apostles of atheism' such as Richard Dawkins predicted that by now Christianity would have pretty much died out, there have been new ways of thinking in science about the astonishing balance of forces of nature which are so finely-tuned it is almost 'as if it had been designed'. With family breakdown, mental-health problems, and so on, Christianity offers the assurance that we are fundamentally known by God and loved by God; we are of intrinsic worth whatever our economic (or social media) output might be. I could go on ... and indeed I might speak on this in church sometime.

Why are we staying 'quiet' then? Well firstly because it is early days - though some statistics do seem to back this phenomenon up, some are questioning the statistics and the survey methods (though I am tempted to think they would not be so rigorous in their criticism had the surveys found the church was declining in number!).

I think we also need to be very humble. The growth often seems to happening largely 'in spite' of the church; perhaps God is quietly showing us all that he is God and that he can do what he wants! Did not Jesus say on his entry into Jerusalem that God could make worshippers out of stones? (Luke 19:14).

Nevertheless, if God is working in this way it raises the question as to what we should do if we do get an increasing number of young, unchurched, and perhaps



even chaotic people coming to faith - how to we disciple and nurture them? What a good 'problem' that would be to have!

So please pray for me to have wisdom on how to use my time this Autumn. Even here in Suffolk I have a number of leads from young people who want to find out more, and I really want to reach out to them.

And finally let us be encouraged. Some of us have lived our whole loves under the oppressive 'narrative of decline', but something new could well be stirring. As the Apostle Paul put it in the book of Ephesians, we should not limit God in our minds ...

"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. (Ephesians 3:20-21)

Glory to you, O Lord

One Sabbath, when Jesus went to eat in the house of a prominent Pharisee, he was being carefully watched. When he noticed how the guests picked the places of honour at the table, he told them this parable: 8 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honour, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. 9 If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, "Give this person your seat." Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. 10 But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, "Friend, move up to a better place." Then you will be honoured in the presence of all the other guests. 11 For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.'

¹² Then Jesus said to his host, 'When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, your relatives, or your rich neighbours; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. 13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, 14 and you will be blessed.
