Reflection ... Two Perspectives

One of the things that I heard a number of times during my sabbatical was that there is 'something happening' among young people. I was reminded for example that statistically young people pray more than older people do (sorry I can't find the reference right now). And I kept hearing remarkable one-off stories about God meeting a young person in a remarkable way - whether through dreams, or reading the Bible, or through on-line outreach. One church in Loughborough gave out around 80 bibles last year to young enquirers wanting to learn more. Perhaps the most striking things for me was a talk I went to given by three middle-aged people who had each faithfully been doing university outreach for between 10 and 20 years. They said that since lockdown there is a new open-ness which has surprised all of them, and that they had started to ask questions about whether the national church would be in a position to accommodate an awakening among the young as and when it happens!

Of course, at the same time we live aware of the gloomy 'narrative of decline' on all sorts of levels which I probably need not elaborate on here! Whereas once the Christian faith was passed on through homes from generation to generation (just look at the inscriptions in family Bibles) there are now arguably two 'missing generations' who are largely unchurched, and many of the stats are getting worse. This means that as Christians we are today charged with both presenting the Christian faith (in what now seems like a marketplace of beliefs) as well as nurturing it.

And yet even here in our small part of Rural Suffolk we have perhaps tasted something of the tension between these two narratives. There are a number of things which encourage me about the faith of our young people including the baptisms and confirmations over the last couple of years, our many points of engagement with young people whether through toddler group, youth group, school assemblies, study groups, the 4 o'clock community (last Sunday we had around 50 attending Messy Church) ... and of course our morning services.

So please pray! Just as the tide can go out the tide can come in; if God wants to bring life where it seems impossible he is more than able to do it. Please pray for wisdom for the ministry team and our PCC's as we meet together at the start of November and reflect on how we 'do church' in our different villages so that we can nurture the faith of young and old, new disciples or lifelong church attenders, whether they come via traditional routes or the more contemporary ones (or a bit of both).

HTLM Choir Invitation to sing in the Christmas Carol Service

If you have always fancied having a go at singing in a choir, especially with Christmas Carols (and the descants), why not consider joining the Melford church choir for the service on December 22nd for the Carol Service at 6.30pm. There's no audition – unless you want one to discover which voice you might be, but you will need to commit to at least three rehearsals, including the one at 5.15pm on the 22nd just before the service itself at 6.30pm.

The rehearsal schedule is given below and we'll be preparing two or three choir only pieces, together with singing through the descant parts (for sopranos). Once I know who is coming, I can email out copies of music, and where possible, links to performances to listen and karaoke with for your own personal practice.

The invitation is open to singers of all voices – Soprano, Alto, Tenor or Bass, but not just adults. If you would like to encourage children to have a sing, and would like to bring them along, they are welcome too. I would suggest 8yrs +and above, given that the rehearsals will be from 7pm – 8.30pm on Thursday evenings. I'd be grateful if adults could accompany any children to the rehearsals, (and stay) for safeguarding reasons, and I do need to know in advance of any children coming, to make arrangements to meet and register them.

Suggestions for Prayer


- We pray for wisdom for our leaders as they debate Assisted Dying.

Collect (prayer for the day)

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: help us so to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that, through patience, and the comfort of your holy word, we may embrace and for ever hold fast the hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**

First Reading

Now there have been many of those priests, since death prevented them from continuing in office; ²⁴ but because Jesus lives for ever, he has a permanent priesthood. ²⁵ Therefore he is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to intercede for them.

²⁶ Such a high priest truly meets our need – one who is holy, blameless, pure, set apart from sinners, exalted above the heavens. ²⁷ Unlike the other high priests, he does not need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for the sins of the people. He sacrificed for their sins once for all when he offered himself. ²⁸ For the law appoints as high priests men in all their weakness; but the oath, which came after the law, appointed the Son, who has been made perfect for ever.

Gospel Reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

Then they came to Jericho. As Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd, were leaving the city, a blind man, Bartimaeus (which means 'son of Timaeus'), was sitting by the roadside begging. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!'

⁴⁸ Many rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!'

⁴⁹ Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him.'

So they called to the blind man, 'Cheer up! On your feet! He's calling you.' ⁵⁰ Throwing his cloak aside, he jumped to his feet and came to Jesus.

⁵¹ 'What do you want me to do for you?' Jesus asked him.

The blind man said, 'Rabbi, I want to see.'

⁵² 'Go,' said Jesus, 'your faith has healed you.' Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.

First Reading

But when Christ came as high priest of the good things that are now already here, he went through the greater and more perfect tabernacle that is not made with human hands, that is to say, is not a part of this creation. ¹² He did not enter by means of the blood of goats and calves; but he entered the Most Holy Place once for all by his own blood, so obtaining eternal redemption. ¹³ The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer sprinkled on those who are ceremonially unclean sanctify them so that they are outwardly clean. ¹⁴ How much more, then, will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from acts that lead to death, ^[C] so that we may serve the living God!

Gospel Reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, 'Of all the commandments, which is the most important?'

²⁹ 'The most important one,' answered Jesus, 'is this: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one. ³⁰ Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." ³¹ The second is this: "Love your neighbour as yourself."[[] There is no commandment greater than these.'

³² 'Well said, teacher,' the man replied. 'You are right in saying that God is one and there is no other but him. ³³ To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and with all your strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself is more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices.'

³⁴ When Jesus saw that he had answered wisely, he said to him, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And from then on no one dared ask him any more questions.
